The new year began with Max Keen entertaining us with his talk 'Pirates, the fact or the fiction'. Max made his entrance dressed as an 18th Century pirate. Pirates were of several nationalities, but most were French. Amongst British pirates was Midlander Captain Charles Johnson,

believed to be the author Daniel Defoe. Max dispelled myths, such as walking the plank, burying treasure and peg legs. They did fly the 'Jolly Roger flag' which originated from France. Eye patches preserved night vision and parrots were deemed suitable for sea. They had a pirate code of no gambling, all had a vote, lights out early, weapons kept in order. Desertion was punishable by death. With projected images, Max advised us that 8 reels made 1 Spanish dollar, hence pieces of eight. A pirate could receive up to 400 pieces of eight for his injuries. Pirates held to the superstition that wearing earrings warded off sickness. Each had a pistol in case they were marooned. Anybody captured by the pirates was branded with a 'P'. Pirates brought to justice were publicly executed in Wapping and their last written testimonies have become collectors items. 1650 was the era of powerful pirates throughout the Caribbean and West Africa. Port Royal in Kingston was their HQ. They drank rum laced with gunpowder and spent money on drink and women. Some famous pirates included Captain William Kidd who was executed in 1701, Black Beard who was decapitated in 1718 and a lady pirate called Anne Bonney who died in1782 aged 80. Max concluded by telling us that Black Bart was the most successful pirate, however even he was defeated and this marked the ending of the golden age of piracy. An entertaining and informative talk as ever by Max.
