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


## **Balsall Heath & Moseley WI**

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#### Four Oaks WI



Smethwick historian Mary Bodfish gave Four Oaks W.I a presentation entitled, "Easy as ABC". Using illustrated projected images, Mary introduced the origins of writing Mesopotamian clay tablets. These used a font known as cuneiform, which was followed by Egyptian hieroglyphs; the earliest use of brush, pen and papyrus paper. She informed us that the Phoenicians used picture writing, from

which the ancient Greeks developed a system using carving which was altered to more familiar alphabet. The Greeks invented cursive (joined-up) writing in 200BC, consisting of small and capital letters to compile an alphabet. The Etruscans used the Greek system with only 23 letters appearing as 'back to front'. Then, the Romans created the Roman demotic script, which was small, with capital letters denoting importance. This script was widely used around the world, including by Christian writers. The Celts who occupied Great Britain had no writing system, but the Angles, Saxons and Jutes used carved inscriptions called Runes, a mix of Greek and Roman lettering. The 7th century Christian church used Latin, the language used in all education. The Domesday book of 1086 used abbreviated Latin and we were shown an image of a page quoting the word Birmingham, the first time a place was guoted in writing.

In 1501, Aldus Manutius started printing in italic. Mary said that the writing style known as 'Secretary' appeared between 1525 & 1680. This was used for official documents and was adopted for everyday writing by the 17th century, Mary illustrated this with an extract of a letter by James Watt in that style. Copperplate alphabet writing appeared using quill pens and in the 1850's, Birmingham became the world's leading centre for the manufacture of steel pen nibs. In the 19th century, Vere Foster invented the Civil Service script, taught in schools. Fountain pens were invented in the 1890's. In the early 20th century italic calligraphy remained influenced by Roman Demotic script.

In the mid-20th century, Marion Richardson, a Birmingham teacher at Moseley School of Art, spearheaded the teaching of handwriting. Sue Richards
