By the time you are reading this item we will have celebrated Mothering Sunday or Mother's Day.

Mothering Sunday and Mother's Day are commonly thought of as being the same thing. The difference



between the two lies in their origin. Mothering Sunday is a Christian holiday in some parts of Europe which always falls on the last Sunday in Lent.

The holiday had little to do with Mothers for most of its history; seeming to start in the early 16th century for people to visit their mother church, the main church or cathedral in the area rather than their actual mother.

Later Mothering Sunday became a day off for servants to see their families. Children in service were also given the day off when they would pick flowers to place in the church or take to their mothers.

The more recognisable form of Mother's Day began in the 20th century in West Virginia, US. In 1907 Anna Jarvis held the first Mother's Day

service in memory of her mother who had been a peace activist caring for wounded soldiers of both sides during the American Civil War. Anna wanted to set aside a day to honour mothers, "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world".

Mother's Day leads us towards Easter and Spring which bring forth new life in so many

ways. Daffodils, tulips and other spring flowers are everywhere, trees are beginning to blossom and we look forward to warmer days ahead. Easter is a very special time of year for so many people and on Easter Sunday it is a time for families to come together to celebrate.

West Midlands Federation are also looking forward to things that lie ahead. We hope that many of you will join us to celebrate our 50th Anniversary year. Four Oaks WI

The speaker at our February meeting was John Wilson, Fund Ambassador for the Buddy bag foundation.

John began by asking us to imagine ourselves as a child living in a domestic violence situation at home. It is night time and suddenly the police are in your room and you are speedily taken with your mother, 50 to 60 miles away to a refuge, a minimum distance for safety. You leave with only your pyjamas. Around 48,000 children find themselves in this situation each year.

The Buddy bag foundation provides each child at the refuge with a bag containing 12 essential items. Groups of 20 volunteers pack the bags which are divided into boys, girls and 5 different age groups. Volunteers pack 180 bags.

John showed us a sample bag. A teddy bear is the last thing put into the bag and thus the first item the child sees when they open it. The bag itself gives the child reassurance and has all they will need for their first few days. Each bag costs £25.

The founder of Buddy bags is Karen Williams OBE. Karen read about the work of Buddy Bags Australia whilst there in 2014 and contacted them. On her return to England, she set up Buddy bags in 2015.

There are no administrative fees or staff salaries due to many company sponsors. In 2022, 57,782 bags were delivered and the foundation won the Queens Award for voluntary services. Presently, there are 314 groups of 4,850 volunteers delivering to 338 refuges in Great Britain. The foundation's headquarters in Minworth also serves for packing.

John concluded by saying that we if we'd like to support them, we can help with packing, online donations, knitting, making a toiletry bag, packing a challenge box or by simply "spreading the word".

On May 2nd 2024, some WM areas will have local elections, alongside the Mayoral Election for Birmingham. You will now need voter ID.

Suitable ID includes UK or EU driving licence or passport, Blue Badge, even an older person's bus pass. You may check <u>here</u> to see if the ID you plan to use is acceptable. If not, you may apply for a 'Voter Authority Certificate'. Follow the below link.
