Judging! An occasional series. NFWI Judge, Debbie Arkinstall.

In order to give an insight into what goes into being a WI judge and what we look for when judging competitions either at National, Federation or Institute level, I felt that a series of articles might be helpful for members.



As some of you may know, in 2021, I gained my NFWI Judges Qualification and Badge, an achievement that I am very proud of considering that it was done during the Covid lockdowns. I started judging long before then as a Local Judge; a person who is considered to be very skilled in his/her particular field and for me that was crafts. I started judging at local WI and horticulture shows and enjoyed it so much that I decided to take it further and well ... here I am.

What does it take to be a judge? The most obvious is having a skill in a particular area, be it crafts, art, cookery, produce, staging and flower

arranging. Within those skill areas you can start to specialise in a particular craft area. For me, it's embroidery. I do enjoy embroidery; I get a huge amount of enjoyment looking at all the different styles and forms. I also judge knitting, crotchet, felting and sewing as these were subjects that I taught in my 'day job' in Further Education.

Training takes the form of workshops and seminars. These are a requirement of the award and sometimes are done on-line, with essays/assessments and a final viva voce with the tutors. When all the assessments and paperwork are completed then you are awarded your judge's badge.

So, that is how I got here, and you now know the difference between a Local and National Judge ... and you never stop learning something new being a WI judge!

The sessions were so enjoyed by everyone, an improvers' session was requested.




Trustees' Trophy



Editor's Choice

No More Violence Against Women

November 25th sees the start of the annual campaign "16 days of Activism to End Gender Based Violence."

Why 16 days? November 25th is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. It is also White Ribbon Day, a day founded by men to show their support for ending such violence, following the 1989 Montreal Massacre of 14 women. (1) This runs until Human Rights Day on the 10th of December; therefore 16 days.

White Ribbon UK state that 1 in 4 girls (2)have experienced unwanted sexual touching at school, my own daughter included, at age 12. Her school was quick to act and suspended the boy before changing his class.

At the gym 6 out of 10 (3) Women have been harassed, and 1.7million women experienced domestic abuse⁽⁴⁾

Abuse may be found anywhere, and the WI, working with other organisations want to promote open dialogue about the actions needed. That starts with education and challenging behaviour when it is seen. The London Assembly have produced two powerful adverts, asking young men to check themselves, by "Saying Maate to a Mate" (5) challenging negative behaviours. Here is the link to 'Have a word', viewer discretion is advised due to scenes of sensitive nature. Many women will identify with the experience portrayed.

To take action, there are a number of things listed on MyWI (5)that you may do, including as simple as encouraging your WI to wear orange if the meeting is within the 16 days. Take a photo and we'll feature it in the January issue. You could also hold a vigil, crochet orange flowers, or lobby the police.

Teams of four are invited to register for this fun event, you can enter more than one team. Depending on the number of entries received the tournament will be based in local areas to reduce travelling cost.


