Words from the Chair

November 2024



As I write this, I am reflecting on our 50th Annual Meeting held at Austin Court on 7th October. We were pleased to see so many of you and hope that you enjoyed the day. Despite a couple of hiccups with our morning speakers, we enjoyed a very interesting talk from the Knowle Donkey Sanctuary. I hope that some of you will be able to visit and see the work that they are doing with the Donkeys in their care. Our afternoon speaker Karl Hinett was truly inspirational and to listen to the story of his life, his time in the Staffordshire Regiment and his road back to recovery was amazing.

In October the clocks go back, the days get shorter, it goes out with Halloween and November comes in with Bonfire Night. When I was a little girl, I thought that Bonfire Night was magical. It was always celebrated on 5th November whatever the weather. On the streets you would see effigies of Guy Fawkes made by children asking "Penny for the Guy" and they would use that money to purchase fireworks. On Bonfire night the "Guy" would be put on top of the bonfire and go up in flames. The week before my grandfather and father would start preparing the bonfire and my grandmother would find some old clothes to make a Guy Fawkes that we stuffed with newspaper to put on the top to burn.

I remember that we always went to Woolworths to buy a box of Fireworks. My father always took out the "Bangers" as I did not like them. Neither did I like "Jumping Jacks" and I remember the boys used to set them off just as you were walking past; I used to run home as fast as I could. As a treat my father would always buy a "Catherine Wheel" as he always told me that they were special just like me. The Bonfire was lit, the rockets placed in empty beer bottles, the fireworks in a bucket of soil and the Catherine Wheel was pinned to a post. My father would light the touchpaper and I would wait in anticipation for it to spin and produce its amazing sparkling display sometimes helped by my father encouraging it to spin using a long stick. We always had hot potatoes, roasted chestnuts, bonfire toffee and toffee apples. The potatoes and chestnuts always cooked on the bonfire. Why did it always rain? The next day was spent in the garden with my grandfather clearing away all the debris. The one thing I do remember is the smell that lingered in the air for the whole of the next day.

November 5th is very different now from when I was a child but I'm sure that seen through the eyes of children today that it is still as magical as it was to me over 70 years ago. Now we also celebrate Diwali

about the same time of year and the fireworks and celebration seem to go on for days. Two very different reasons to remember and celebrate November.

We have two more Federation events planned before we say goodbye to 2024. The planned outing to Waddesdon Manor on 21st November has been very popular and our last event is our Christmas Celebration on Saturday 7th December at 11am at St Martins in the Bullring. It is always a joyous occasion and we hope that as many of you as possible will be able to join us and celebrate bringing to a close our 50th Anniversary Year.

BH&M WI attended a foraging walk, sampling unusual tastes from the overlooked plants of hedgerows and meadows along the River Rea in Stirchley. Pictured above, Stephanie Bale from Sustainable Life explains



the dangers of giant hogweeds, before introducing us to the seeds of an edible hogweed variant, which had a papery, nutty taste. We also tried the seeds and flowers of Himalayan Balsam (an invasive species), White Deadnettle (mushroom flavour),

Rowan Berries, Plantain and wild Horseradish. Please do not sample wild foods unless you are with an experienced forager, as it is easy to confuse edibles with their poisonous look-a-likes. Below, we are deterred from munching rosehips due to their internal barbs, best removed by boiling and straining through muslin. All enjoyed the walk.

Guest Speaker: Karl Hinett



On the theme of 'Inspiration', Dudley soldier Karl Hinett delivered his story of injury in Basra from the heart. In 2005, aged 19, he was a gunner in a Warrior tank with the Staffordshire Regiment when they encountered rioting. Damage to the vehicle's sights by bricks & grenades forced them to open their hatch, to coincide with the arrival of a petrol bomb. With bare hands to exit the tank, he escaped as a fireball, eventually taken to Selly Oak hospital with thirty-seven percent burns to his hands, face & body. Since then, he has endured over 100 hours of operations to free his hands. He has also ran 127 marathons, earned his pilot's licence, trekked to the North & South poles and attempted Everest whilst fundraising. Truly Inspirational.

We want to create a wall hanging to commemorate the WIs that are part of our West Midlands Federation in this our 50th year.



Either as a group, or a talented individual, we would like you to design a fabric square.

The design should include the name of your WI, and be a visual representation of your group (only one design per WI). You could show your meeting place, your town/village, the activities you typically take part in.

The squares will be added to a backdrop, with a map of the county in the centre. Threads will join your square to its location on the map. The finished wall hanging will be taken to shows and events, and will be used as a recruitment tool, to showcase all WIs.

You can embroider, quilt, applique, use beadwork, cross stich, or any other stitchcraft. The square must not be knitted or crocheted. Your finished design will measure 9 inches x 9inches with a 3 inch undecorated border all around (total size of fabric 12 inches square, the round picture above is for design ideas only.

The deadline is June 2025. We look forward to seeing your designs.
